Secretary's Message

Fellow Nuclear Weaponsmen,

The association's annual reunion in Indianapolis looks to be shaping up to be a good one. Guy and Regenia have several good tours set up, but there are many other things to see in "Indy". One of my favorite places is the Rathskeller, which prior to World War One was called Das Deutsche Haus (The German House). The building is now called the Athenaeum and has received historic landmark status. It is a German cultural center, and Indianapolis' oldest restaurant, in operation since 1894, serving traditional Germanic fare. Beer lovers will find much to love on the drink menu, as the biergarten and Kellerbar offer selections from Germany, Europe, and the U.K. It is located at 401 East Michigan Street, the website is:

Another interesting landmark is the Slippery Noodle Inn. It is a large blues bar and restaurant and has the distinction of being the oldest

continuously operating bar in the state of Indiana having opened in 1850 as the Tremont House.

The Inn served as a stop on the Underground Railroad during the Civil War. During prohibition it was called a restaurant, although beer was still being made in the basement, and later it housed a brothel until 1953.

The Slippery Noodle is the oldest commercial building in the city. Its tin ceiling dates to 1890 and the oak bar is also over a century old. The Inn has operated under its current name since 1963. It is located at 372 S Meridian St. The website is:

The Historian's article provides information on the end of the WT rate. Here is some information on the beginning of our rate, our first senior and master chiefs:

The First NW Super Chiefs

The pay grades of E-8 and E-9, Senior Chief and Master Chief, were created effective June 1, 1958, under a 1958 Amendment to the Career Compensation Act of 1949. Eligibility for promotion to E-8, the Senior Chief level, was restricted to Chiefs with a minimum of four years in grade and a total of ten years of service. For elevation from E-7 to Master Chief, E-9, a minimum of six years of service as a CPO with a total of 13 years of service was required.

Service-wide examinations for outstanding Chiefs were held on August 5, 1958, with the first promotions becoming effective on 16 November 1958. The names of the first group of selectees are listed in Bureau of Naval Personnel Notice 1430 of 17 October 1958.

The 25 October 1958 issue of Navy Time listed 1060 names that became the first group of Chiefs to be promoted to the new "Super Chiefs" grade. 146 were promoted to Master Chief and 914

promoted to Senior Chief effective 16 November 1958.

The first NWCM was H.W. Carier, the first NWCS were J.R. Bland, H.R. Duley, and J.B. Randolph.

A few months later, a second group of Chiefs from the February 1959 examinations were elevated to E-8 and E-9 effective on 16 May 1959. The names of the second group of selectees were listed in Bureau of Naval Personnel Notice 1430 of 20 May 1959.

The 8 June 1959 issue of Navy Times listed 1145 names that became the second group of Chiefs to be promoted to the "Super Chiefs" grade; 151 were promoted to Master Chief and 994 were promoted to Senior Chief effective 16 May 1959.

There were no NWCMs made, and only one NWCS, C.H. Hicks. The lead-in to the JUN 59 Navy Times Article is placed at the end of this

newsletter so it can be enlarged to make it easier to read.

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After the May 1959 elevations, promotions to E-9 were through Senior Chief only.

BuPers Notice 1430 dated 5 November 1959 published the third group of Chiefs to be promoted to "Super Chiefs". There were 336 promoted to Master Chief E9 and 2305 were promoted to Senior Chief E8, effective 16 December 1959.

Promoted to NWCM was J.R. Bland, promoted to NWCS was B.E. Lay and A.K. Stephenson.

Promoted to NWCM were J.B. Randolph, A.K. Stephenson, and M.S. Thompson. Making NWCS were J.D. Blakeslee, G.W. Garbers, R.D. Hawkins, S. Slaughter, and X. Wiesenhaven.

4051 Will Be 'Super Chiefs' December 16

WASHINGTON—The Navy will have 4051 more one and two-star chiefs on Dec. 16. This is the number selected for promotion to the "super chief" grades by the fiscal 1961 selection board.

In the total are 3209 who will go to E-8 and 842 who will move up to E-9. There were selections to senior and master chief in every rating except patternmaker, in which selections to senior chief only were made.

Included in the totals are 16 Waves who made senior chief and two who were advanced to E-9. One wave E-8 is a disbursing clerk, one a personnelman and one a radioman. Five will go up in the storekeeper and eight in the yeoman ratings.

Both of the Wave E-9s are yeomen.

The advancements will be permanent appointments for those accepting them. Those going up to E-8 must agree to remain on active duty for two years after promotion. The new E-9s have to agree to remain for three years after promotion.

The biggest list of new master chiefs is for aviation machinist's

star grade were aviation machinist's mates and electronics technicians, each with 201.

There were three selections to master chief for the boilermakers but only one to senior chief, a reversal of the pattern in the other rates where there were, as would normally be expected, more selections to E-8 than to E-9.

Examinations for the two super chief grades are normally held on the first Tuesday in August. Spokesmen say that current plans call for this pattern to be repeated for the fiscal 1962 selections.

The dues date will be listed in the date column on the right of your name on the membership roster. Some members find it convenient to pay their dues several years in advance. This can save you postage and the Treasurer, Secretary, and Web Master a considerable amount of time in processing payment.

Historian's Message

Here is a little information of the disestablishment of the NW/GMT/WT rating.

WASHINGTON (NNS) – As of April 1, 1996, the Navy's Weapons Technician (WT) rating was no longer. The Weapons Technician (WT) rating was created in January of 1986, WTs initially absorbed a sub-specialty of the Gunner's Mate Technician rating (specifically the "bomb" types, those who had NEC's related to Nuclear Weapons) billets when that community was disestablished. The other sub-specialty of the GMT rate was Anti-Submarine Rockets (ASROC) which had differing NECs and sea-shore rotations.

The mission of WTs was to maintain, assemble, disassemble, test and convert nuclear weapons, warheads and their components.

Secretary of the Navy John H. Dalton approved the disestablishment of the WT rating in 1994 after all tactical nuclear weapons were removed from Navy commands. The need for a dedicated rating to handle the weapons had diminished to the extent that disestablishment was deemed appropriate. Prior to the formal announcement of the disestablishment in October 1994, about 300 of the more than 500 WTs had already converted to other ratings. In the seventeen months since the announcement, almost all of the remaining WTs had converted to other ratings or retired. On April 1, 1996, WTs who have not converted were assigned to duties as Aviation Ordnancemen for the remainder of their current enlistment. As they bid farewell to one of the Navy's most specialized ratings, it was encouraging to know that so many former WTs made the decision to 'stay Navy.' Those Sailors had gone on to viable careers in other ratings, helping to meet the needs of the post-Cold-War Navy.

Since our last Newsletter our memorabilia is now up to 508 items. All items are inventoried and photographed. I have been sending out "Welcome Aboard" letters to new members and reinstated members. I am also working on getting everyone in one of the Profile binders, these binders are where we have everyone's history for all the membership to read at the Annual Reunion's.

Our military history is very important since our rating is no longer active in the US Navy, this association is truly a "Last NW/GMT/WT Standing" association. One day there will be only one member left standing. That member will have the responsibility to ensure that all of our memorabilia, history and personal history is turned over to a military museum for everyone to see and enjoy and learn about us.

With the Access program up and running this is a database that will continue to grow with new members and their data. Once your information is in the system it is in there forever. Through the Access program we currently have the following reports that we can print out:

- Rank report,
- Program entry date (this report helps us identify the Gray Dragon)
- Member contact list (All past/present members)
- Duty station report
- Member contact report includes all past/present members, this report does include all past members that have been removed from the Treasurers Roster.

As of 08 APRIL 2016 we have 891 Past/Present members entered in the database. Out of the 891 shipmates 594 are listed with their duty stations. This information comes from a members application form or them filling out the personal profile sheet and mailing it to me. This is why I ask everyone to write your military history down with duty stations and dates in the Navy. That way I can enter your history into the database. But I can ONLY do that if your write it down and email or mail it to me.

1060 Selected for Top Grades

WASHINGTON.—The E-8 and E-9 lists are out. In all, they contained 1060 names, 15 less than were expected. Of the total, 146 were promotions to master chief (E-9) and 914 were to senior chief (E-8). The complete list of those selected is contained at the end of this story. Those picked will add one or two stars, as appropriate to their crowns Nov. 16.

In the selections, there were none picked for master chief boilermaker or for senior chief instrumentman. There were eligibles for each of these rates, but the board concluded that there were no qualified personnel in the competition. There were selections to both E-8 and E-9 in all other ratings.

Among the selections for E-8 were five Waves. Two will go to senior chief yeoman and one each will move up in the storekeeper, personnel man and aerographer's mate ratings. No Waves were picked for E-9.

Biggest bloc of selections in any given rating was the 31 who went to E-8 in the aviation machinist's mate designation. Radiomen and machinist's mate tied for second with 47 each.

In the E-9 selections, aviation machinist's mates and radiomen were tied with eight for the largest number of selections.

The lists published this week are the first for this fiscal year. A second examination, to be held in February, will be used to establish a second list for this fiscal year. It is expected that about 150 E-9s and 925 E-8s will be promoted when the second list is released.

Despite BuPers efforts to cut down the number

of applications for the first examination to about 9000 through use of a quota system, about 18,000 competed in the August tests. It was from this group that selections were made.

In the February examination, no quota system will be established, Vice Adm. H. P. Smith, Chief of Naval personnel, says. The so-called quota, Smith has indicated, was designed more as a guide line for commanding officers, rather than a hard-and-fast limit on the number of chiefs who could be recommended for promotion by any command.

In the February exam, Smith said, every chief who is eligible and can get his commanding officer's recommendation will get the opportunity to take the tests. In addition, he said that the reenlistment board which will screen reenlistment applications of chiefs in 24 ratings who want to reenlist beyond 22 years, will not meet until after E-8 and E-9 selections are made.

This delayed meeting of the reenlistment board, he pointed out, will make it impossible for a man to be promoted to E-8 or E-9 and then be denied reenlistment.

Promotions based on the second exams are expected to be made in May.

Navy Lists 1145 Super Chiefs; 151 Go to E-9 and 994 to E-8

WASHINGTON. — The second group of new "super" chiefs—1145 of them—has been selected by the Navy.

A Navy selection board which started in the Bureau of Naval Personnel on April 13, picked 151 CPOs for promotion to pay grade E-9, while another 994 chiefs were advanced to E-8.

All promotions became effective as of May 16, 1959.

The promotions are the result of the E-8 and E-9 promotion examinations conducted last Feb. 3.

Last Nov. 16 the Navy advanced its first group of super chiefs—146 to master chief and 914 to senior chief.

Since the E-8 and E-9 promotion program is new—authorized by the last military pay legislation—the Navy allowed CPOs in pay grade E-7 to try for E-9 advancements during the February exam.

The new E-9 promotion list shows that 82 of the 151 authorized advancements came from chiefs in pay grade E-7.

The next super chief promotion tests will be held Aug. 4, 1959.
