Historian's Message

Merry Christmas Shipmates!

Let me introduce myself as the new Historian. I am Jay Lindstrom, GMTC 0926/0927 Ret. I was a West Coaster my entire 20 years – AUW 0403 at Whidbey Island, four carriers, NWSA Oakland, NWEF and lastly NWTGP Inspection Dept.

The biggest issue facing me and the Board is all the memorabilia that has been donated over the years. Guy Clemons has moved the memorabilia into storage in Indiana, but it fills many large storage bins. Shipping all this weight to each reunion is just not possible. This summer before the next reunion several of the board members are going to meet for 2 or 3 days to go through all of it and decide what is of enough value to bring to the reunions, what can be scanned and kept on computers (virtually all documents, publications, photos, cruise books, etc.) and what can be donated to museums. All who have provided material are asked to let us know if they would like it back before this happens. Getting the reunion designated items into only a very few containers that can easily fit in my Toyota RAV4 will be ideal. We plan to have computers available to see all the printed material.

One thing I've noticed in the past bulletins is the small amount of actual historical information that is presented. This is natural as nearly everything of interest has already been printed somewhere, so why repeat it? Well, as Ron Moran always told me at the Inspection Dept., when it comes to

knowledge about nuclear weapons, I was full of it. Here is my chance to historiate, and pass on information that has never before been published. I was very fortunate to have lived in Los Alamos about 20 years ago. My wife and I lived in half of one of the old duplexes, and our landlord lived in the other half. His name was Steven Kasunic and he had been one of the original Project members that started there in March 1943.

He was the project engineer for the Hiroshima bomb and knew all the major characters – Oppenheimer, Gen. Groves, Fermi on down to the technicians and machinists, including Army Sgt. David Greenglass, brother of Ethel Rosenberg. I spent hours talking with Steve and learned an absolutely incredible amount about the entire Los Alamos operation. In my column in the Bulletin I will be including as much of this as I can.

Early in the war Steve was a mechanical engineer employed by the Navy Bureau of Ordnance and was assigned to the new Oerlikon 20mm project. He had also been informed that he would be going into the Navy as an engineering officer, and even knew what ship he would be riding. In the meantime he was working on production problems with the 20mm ammunition. The projectile consisted of a body, fuze and fuze cap. The body was no problem to make, large enough and cylindrical for easy machining, with only one female thread for the fuze cap. But the cap was another story. It was small, the outer surface was the curved ogive and it had an external AND an internal thread (for the fuze itself). It took 30 machinists on 30 lathes, with millwrights and supply and support personnel to make 300 fuze caps an hour. But anyone who has ever seen a film of ships under Kamikaze attack knows that all those Oerlikon guns would shoot off an hour's worth of production in a matter of a few seconds.

Steve Kasunic was brilliant and designed a machine that would spit out 2 fuze caps every 4 seconds, 24/7. During the entire war the Navy needed only three of the machines to produce the millions of fuze caps needed. But he was still

going to be inducted into the Navy. However, there was a BuOrd officer who was well aware of Steve's machine and his abilities. The officer was CDR William Parsons.

Upcoming Reunion Information

We are deeply involved in setting the initial plans for the 2018 Reunion. We have signed and submitted the contract for the hotel. The reunion is to be held in the **Sheraton Westport Lakeside Chalet at the Westport Plaza**. The address is:

191 Westport Plaza
St. Louis, Missouri.

The reunion dates scheduled will be from Monday 24 September 2018 till Friday 28 September 2018.

These are the three tours selected for the St. Louis Reunion:

St. Louis City Tour (9:00am – 4:00pm)

This is the grand tour of all the sites to see. Take in Laclede's Landing, a revitalized 19th century warehouse district with cobblestone streets and cast iron street lamps. Drive through the Souldard area on your way to the Anheuser-Busch Brewery. Begin your walking tour of the Brewery with the famous Clydesdales, then view the brewing and packaging process, and end with complimentary beer samples in the Hospitality House.

Lunch on your own and free time at Union Station. First opened in 1894, this restored National Historic Landmark is a festive marketplace with numerous restaurants, eateries, and specialty shops.

Re-board bus and continue the city tour with a stop at the New Cathedral to see one of the largest collections of mosaic art in the Western Hemisphere. Also drive through Forest Park where the St. Louis Zoo and several museums are located.

Civil War Museum at Jefferson Barracks

(Time: TBD)

The only real military attraction in St. Louis can be found at Jefferson Barracks. This Military Post is the oldest operational military installation west of the Mississippi River. Originally established in

1826 as the country's first Infantry School of Practice, Jefferson Barracks received its name in honor of President Thomas Jefferson who had died earlier that same year. Jefferson Barracks was established on land that Thomas Jefferson had actually obtained as part of the Louisiana Purchase, which added to the argument that the first major military installation should bear his name. On the grounds you will find a wonderful Civil War Museum.

Gateway Arch / Westward Expansion Museum

Arrive at the Gateway Arch and the Museum of Westward Expansion. While there, taken a tram ride to the top of the tallest national monument in the United States and experience the breathtaking, panoramic view of downtown St. Louis.

Afterwards, visit the Museum of Westward Expansion tracing the nation's settlement of the frontier with images, quotations, and artifacts. Or, for a nominal fee and time permitting, enjoy the forty-minute film "Monument to the Dream", and learn how this magnificent structure was built.

The times of the tours are approximate or will be provided more accurately at a later time.
