NNWA Proposed Bylaw Change for 2019

The president has expressed his desire to clarify the eligibility requirements for Regular membership; specifically in the NNWA By-Laws, Article IV, Section 2 A.

Currently Article IV, Section 2A reads: "A. Have had duties requiring knowledge of the inspection, loading, operational use, support, assembly, or disassembly of nuclear weapons, or"

It is proposed that the words "knowledge of" be removed. This would change Article IV, Section 2A to read "Have had duties requiring the inspection, loading, operational use, support, assembly, or disassembly of nuclear weapons, or".

This proposed change will be voted on at the Annual Business Meeting of the association membership to be held at 1000 11 OCT 19. Absentee or proxy votes are not allowed so all members are highly encouraged to attend the reunion and vote on this proposed bylaws change.

Just a reminder, I maintain the SOP/PDL. If you have any recommended changes to this document then forward them to a board member for consideration. If approved I will update the SOP/PDL

Secretary's Message

Fellow Weaponeers,

Our upcoming reunion will be held in Jacksonville, FL. Many members were stationed in the area back when our rate was active. The Yellow Water annex, which was then across Normandy Boulevard from the former Cecil Field Naval Air Station, once housed nuclear weapons. The Yellow Water Weapons Storage Area compound, situated in a vast pine forest, was enclosed by a barbed-wire fence.

The annex was built as a gunnery range in World War II. At some point, it switched to weapons storage and included a helicopter pad, Marine barracks and mess hall.

There were 89 ammunition bunkers, ranging from small buildings for high explosives to earthcovered bunkers with heavy steel doors for the nuclear weapons. The weapons have been gone since the early 1990s. Cecil Field, which is about 13 miles west of downtown Jacksonville was decommissioned in 1999, turned over to the city for redevelopment and later converted into Cecil Commerce Center. The Jacksonville Equestrian Center, the Jacksonville Aquatic Center, a community center, softball complex and other amenities are on the Yellow Water or northern part of the base. Two bunkers inside the heavily guarded area and 21 "igloos" outside the highersecurity area are all that remained a few years ago. Their powder-blue doors were all open.

Later, some of the bunkers were used by Northrop Grumman to store airplane parts. In recent decades, the area has had the eerie stillness of a ghost town. The roads entering Cecil and Yellow Water have been reconfigured, and the original entrance razed so it might be difficult for those unfamiliar with the area to figure out where it once was.

That said, park users are allowed to walk and ride bikes or horses, but no vehicles, other than maintenance, are allowed to drive on the asphalt trail. Here is a link to some old pictures of the facility:

We now have 992 members listed on the membership roster; 468 members in good standing; 52 life members (spouses of deceased members); 459 past members (members with unpaid dues for three years); 97 members with dues in arrears; and one reciprocal member (NAAV). During those two years we had spent many months picking up boiler plates practicing for the Mercury recovery missions and also as a guard ship for the first Polaris shot from a submerged submarine.

We also spent much time around Cuba on Sub patrols. It will be enjoyable for me to see how much the area has changed from those days. I know many of you will have different memories. I look forward to seeing you all there and being available for you.

Historian's Message

Continuing with my conversations with Steve Kasunic, original member of the Manhattan Project:

I asked Steve if the fear of the Germans getting a nuclear bomb first was a real concern. "Absolutely!" he replied. It was the overriding threat for everyone. Nearly all the top scientists on the Hill had known Germany's best – Werner Heisenberg and Otto Hahn, and several others – for many years, and that they had 3 or 4 years head start on us and the Brits, but no one knew how far. We had to find out.

General Groves took the military option – when in doubt, ATTACK. He set up a combined scientific and military operation, a group of 30 to 40 dedicated volunteers, scientists and Army intelligence types from the Hill and sent them to Europe. They landed in France a few weeks after D-Day, equipped with weapons, jeeps, a few armored cars and a letter signed by Eisenhower directing all Allied forces to render any required assistance under the highest priority. They were commanded by Col. Boris Pash, one of the Manhattan Project's intelligence group. Their main targets were enemy scientists, documents, equipment and, if found, Uranium. Someone decided to get cute and named the project Operation ALSOS. In Greek, Alsos means "groves". The General was furious, but knew the worst thing to do would be to re-name it and so attract attention to it.

Steve had gone to college with one of the team scientists and got the full story of the mission when the guy got back to Los Alamos after the war. Their first target was the French scientist Frederic Joliot (son-in-law of Pierre and Marie Curie), and his laboratory in Paris. Col. Pash, and all the Alsos members, had every reason to get the mission done as quickly as possible, and were actually among the very first into Paris, right along with the French 2nd Armored Division, and ahead of any US troops. They engaged in combat with fleeing German troops (and would again), and located Joliot. The scientist, his papers and much of his equipment were taken, and his brain picked. He gave them the last known locations of many on the Hit List and the team took off, next stop Brussels, Belgium. The city wasn't completely captured, but that small detail only delayed them a little. It went like that into the Netherlands and finally Germany itself, each new prisoner leading them to another.

Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin had agreed on how to split up Germany after the war, but Col. Pash did not pay much attention to future borders. The team went into British and French territory, and even areas destined for the Russians, wherever their leads sent them. Often they were hampered by German troops wanting to surrender. Otto Hahn and his entire laboratory were taken, including Germany's only reactor, and tons of Uranium that had been buried. All this material was flown back to the US (ships were too slow) reactor and Uranium included, for close examination.

Speed was essential, especially as the Russians had their own version of Alsos. We wanted ALL of the targets, and if they were somewhere our forces could not get to them, Gen. Groves would have the Army Air Force bomb them – several times factories and laboratories would get visits from as many as 800 B-17s, to be sure the Russians didn't get them either. Finally, at the very end of the war, the team caught up with Werner Heisenberg, right under the noses of diehard SS troops.

But by then it was known that the Germans were never even close to producing a real weapon. Their reactor had never gone critical, they had never separated U-235 in useful quantities and did not know how to mass produce Pu-239. And then Steve dropped a bombshell on me. He told me the Japanese had been far ahead of Germany.
